Yoder Kansas  
Nov 26 1926

Dear Eunice and all greeting  
this is Friday morning after  
Breakfast. I arrived here on  
wed morning. first service for  
me on wed evening. had a  
big crowd. even Floyd & Floy came  
over to see me.

on Thursday being  
Thanksgiving Andrew & Amy  
came over bringing my sister  
Anna. Myrtle & Dublin. there  
of course we a crowd of our  
own had to all go to one  
place for dinner. at the  
home of J. Heading. that was  
fine. we spent the afternoon  
in visiting and singing.

on Thursday night we  
had a larger crowd. now the  
weather has been mild wed,  
wed night it threatened rain  
but you know this is a dry  
country just like I. I. one  
Thanksgiving morning it was  
dear with the wind from



the sun the most, very warm  
and fine. but by noon the  
wind and shifted to the southwest  
and such a wind all afternoon  
and clouds sailing as if it  
would snow any minute. but  
finally cleared during the  
night. this is saving the  
wind from the southwest  
not very cold & clear. I am  
feeling well this morning.

Now I very anxious to  
hear from home. how about  
Dan McIntire. do they have a  
farm by this time, are they  
gone elsewhere. Dan said  
on our way to when that he  
would help to bear the burden  
of food supplies. so I told him to  
stay a few days longer until he  
was fully convinced he could  
not get a farm.

Some of those  
families that came from here  
to & are back again. they  
say no more by for them.  
they are very inquisitive  
about mine.

so I hope 2 plans have a farm  
and stay there. as we may  
have more to come our  
way. I suppose you had  
a good day at charity's as  
we can always enjoy ourselves  
there. I wrote Vera a card  
but I am sure she won't  
not get until Fri morning.  
also one for Elsworth,  
you will get that today some  
how I thought much of you  
on Thursday.

this is a great country  
for a prairie, a large  
settlement of Amish here,  
and more than that. they  
are making arrangements  
for me to visit their  
preachers. that will require  
some nerve. as you know  
why.



Now I don't think  
of anything else. only  
Whenever you think Charlie  
and John are ready to ship  
and those two Doves ship  
them. I hardly think for  
another two weeks.  
Just as you think I  
notice cattle are going  
up. I hope you are all  
well. May I hear  
from you. after Dec  
I write me at Canton  
To Wm R Landis.
